
How Does Delaware Fund Schools?

School districts and charter schools get their revenue (or funding) from state, local, and federal sources. In Delaware, state funding makes up the largest share of school funding, 57 percent, followed by the local, 30 percent, and federal, 13 percent, portions.


In school year 2021-22, Delaware reported \$2,793,464,285.66 in total revenue.

Revenue by Fund Type for 2021-22




Education Spending for the State



Total education spending for the state in 2021-22 was \$2,612,814,844.



Opportunity Funds

Opportunity Funding provided \$616 per student from low-income background and \$616 per multilingual learner student in SY2021-22.
